1. The Biblical Mandate

"In a culture where busyness is prized, where isolation is rampant, and where 'blinking devices' replace genuine relationships, hospitality offers a beautiful and countercultural rebellion...One of the most countercultural things you can do is have an entire conversation with someone without checking your phone." Entertaining vs. Hospitality – "Entertaining says, 'I want to impress you with my beautiful home, my clever decorating, my gourmet cooking.' Hospitality, however, seeks to minister. It says, 'This home is not mine. It is truly a gift form my Master. I am his servant, and I use it as he desires.' Hospitality does not try to impress but to serve." (*Open Heart, Open Home*, by Karen Mains, p. 29)

Rosaria Butterfield – (Former feminist, lesbian professor at Syracuse University) - She became friends with a pastor and his wife (in their 70's) after Pastor Ken responded to an editorial with some questions for her to consider. When she responded to his invitation to discuss them by phone, they invited her into their home. "They did not act as if such conversations were polluting them. They did not treat me like a blank slate. When we ate together, Ken prayed in a way I had never heard before. His prayers were intimate. Vulnerable. He repented of his sin in front of me. He thanks God for all things. Ken's God was holy and firm, yet full of mercy...Then one ordinary day, I came to Jesus, openhanded and naked. In this war of worldviews, Ken was there. Floy was there. The church that had been praying for me for years was there. Jesus triumphed. And I was a broken mess. Conversion was a train wreck. I did not want to lose everything that I loved. But the voice of God sang a sanguine love song in the rubble of my world. I weakly believed that if Jesus could conquer death, he could make right my world."
