

Week of May 14: Philip and the Ethiopian
Acts 8:26–39

ASK interactive questions.

1. Is there anyone too important to need Jesus? Is there anyone not important enough to receive Jesus as their Savior? How come?
2. How did Philip respond to God's instruction to walk beside the Ethiopian's carriage? How would you have responded in that situation?
3. What was the result of Philip's obedience? What does that mean for us when God gives us an instruction?

BRING your understanding.

Share one thing you learned about Philip and the Ethiopian from your adult Life Group lesson.

CREATE fun experiences.

Activity: Chariot Race

Supplies: Paper, string, a hole puncher, and a few action figures (or small toys)

Inform your family that they will compete in a chariot race. Give each family member a piece of paper, and have them each use their paper to make a small box with an opening on one side (use this video to show you how to do that: <https://youtu.be/caDwbe02l6g>). Then, punch a hole on one side of each box, and tie a long piece of string through the hole. The boxes are the "chariots." Next, instruct everyone to place a small action figure (or toy) inside their box. Determine a course around your house, and time each family member as they pull their chariot through the course. They must start over if their action figure falls out of the chariot. The person who makes it through the course the fastest is the winner!

Tell your family that God instructed Philip to talk with a man who was riding in a chariot. Philip obeyed God's instructions, and the man decided to become a Christian!
